From Nanning I headed north past Guilin to the Dragon's Backbone rice terraces, a scenic location of rice terraces and wooden villages. From there I headed west in to the area populated by the Dong minority group. The Dong are famous for the there wooded buildings and covered "wind and rain" bridges built entirely of wood without the use of nails. The most famous of these bridges is in the town of Chengyang, my first destination in the Dong region. As picturesque as the region is there relatively little tourism due in part to the poor roads in the area. But there are attempts to remedy this and many of the roads were under construction and the town of Chengyang was putting in new pathways in what looked like an attempt to get ready of the inevitable onslaught of tour buses that will descend on the


